- Supply Chain Resiliency
















Supply Chain Resiliency: White House Priority

- Focuses on critical minerals and infrastructure
- Seeks to mitigate healthcare equipment and medicine shortage by leveraging the Defense Production Act
- Cross-government supply chain data sharing
- Investment in supply chain infrastructure

Where are we headed in 2024?

- Political Factions within Congress will make compromising elusive
- Concerns from the Right and Left regarding the U.S. debt could slow the tenets of Bidenomics
- Customs Modernization proposals will compete with Immigration Reform
- Forced Labor and Environmental Regulations will increase
- Possible 301 tariff relief: exclusions and relief for some consumer goods
- Increasing political sanctions and export controls
- Policy proposals from Capitol Hill will look more like the Presidential candidates' positions....Trump vs. Biden



U.S. Importers and Exporters are:

What can you do to prepare?

- Leveraging technology, using machine learning to stay informed and to know your customer and supplier.
- Taking a strategic approach to data for the management of physical things, leveraging the internet of things.
- Sustainable supply chains matter, as governments and NGO's are increasingly applying scrutiny over corporate supply chains.
- Resiliency: Planning for supply-chain disruptions, as they seemed to be occurring with greater frequency.
- On-Demand and Customized solutions are driving supply chains and sourcing locations, could be the norm for the foreseeable future.
- Pursuing government support from their country's Capitals, more domestic industries are finding sympathetic politicians seeking to support nationalism.
- Seeking organizations and industry partnerships to address business ills. Industry must find a way......
